Martin Luther King, Jr. Internship Program Update

This year marks the 26th anniversary of our successful summer internship program. The program, which is designed to promote and support minority attorneys' work in the Pennsylvania Legal Aid Network (PLAN) programs across the Commonwealth, has hosted a total of 362 law students to date. The goal of the program is to initiate future attorneys to the lifelong commitment of providing access to justice for all individuals regardless of their ability to pay and to promote diversity in PLAN programs. Ten paid internships are awarded each summer to law students who participate in legal services work over a 10 week period. This year, PLAN hosted 10 interns. A one-day poverty law training is provided at the beginning of the internship. At the end of the program, interns are also asked to complete an essay sharing their summer experiences which are compiled into a booklet called the MLK Intern Drum Major Essay Collection. Marissa, MLK Intern Class of 2017, received her JD in May from the Penn State Dickinson School of Law and graduated with a BS in Criminal Justice and minors in Psychology and Economics from Cedar Crest College. Marissa dedicated her law school career to public interest work and is committed to giving a legal voice to individuals who may not otherwise have an opportunity to be heard. Among other responsibilities, Marissa will be delivering legal assistance at the Pennsylvania Health Law Project to medically fragile children whose requests for in-home care are denied, reduced or eliminated. She will also assist Medicaid-eligible Pennsylvanians to maximize in-home service through written and oral advocacy efforts.

Current Martin Luther King, Jr. Fellows Continue to Shine

In our previous newsletter, we introduced you to **Kadeem Morris.**Kadeem began his fellowship at the Pennsylvania Utility Law Project (PULP) in August 2017. Kadeem's responsibilities include staffing the program's utility hotline, drafting briefs and interrogatories for large scale litigation, conducting web-based and in-person trainings, and meeting with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) and other community partners in an



effort to assist Pennsylvania low-income residential utility and energy consumers connect to and maintain

affordable utility and energy services within their homes. Kadeem is a member of and participates in various PLAN law group events.



We also introduced you to **Hermionne Cadet**. Hermionne also began her fellowship at MidPenn Legal Services (MPLS) in August 2017. Hermionne is heavily involved in the MPLS HOPE Shelter Project. She regularly visits homeless shelters to do outreach and assist clients with housing, custody, divorce, social security and Protection From Abuse (PFA) matters. She also provides direct representation to clients involved in custody and PFA cases. Like Kadeem, Hermionne is a member of and participates in various PLAN law group events.

Fellowship Program Success

We are extremely pleased with the success of the MLK Fellowship Program. Since its inception in 2004, 22 lawyers have been placed as fellows with PLAN legal aid programs and scores of other former interns have entered other public interest careers. The Fellowship Program is an integral part of PLAN, Inc.'s goal to initiate new lawyers into public interest law careers. PLAN, Inc. partners with a sponsoring regional or specialty legal services program and pays 50% of the Fellow's salary, benefits, and student loan assistance up to \$5500 each per year of the two year fellowship. Salary is commensurate with that of the sponsoring program.

In the past fiscal year, PLAN programs handled about 66,000 client cases; saving their homes from foreclosure, protecting them from domestic violence, securing health insurance, establishing custody stability for children, and helping clients in many other ways.

The Fellowship Program has a proven track record of launching minority law students into careers as public interest lawyers and legal aid attorneys and has generated a reliable recruitment pool for legal aid organizations. PLAN, Inc. appreciates the financial support and sponsorships it receives from Pennsylvania law firms, businesses, and individuals to help support this program. PLAN, Inc. does not realize any of these sponsorship funds, but funnels them directly to the salary and benefits of our fellows. PLAN, Inc. also appreciates the financial support of this program from the Department of Human Services and the Pa. IOLTA Board. Our goal is to place at least 2 fellows per fiscal year.
